- 1. This memorandum sets forth the mutual trade concessions and contributions to the Multilateral Trade Negotiations agreed to by the Government of the Republic of Indonesia and the Covernment of the United States of America. Implementation of this understanding is dependent on the contingencies set forth in the following paragraphs.
- 2. In accordance with the provisions of paragraph five of the Tokyo Declaration, Indonesia is prepared to make contributions to the Multilateral Trade Negotiations. In this regard, Indonesia notes that tariff reductions on a large number of items have been made in 1978 and in 1979.
- (a) Indonesia is prepared to reduce and/or bind the tariffs as specified in the offers column on the following items requested by the United States:
