Mode 3 in FATS: few reporters (big time-lag)


Economists



Supply of Services by Modes New 2011 Statistical Approximation

Mode of Supply	Estimated share
1 - cross-border supply	30 %
2 - consumption abroad	10 %
3 - commercial presence	55 %
4 – presence of natural persons	less than 5% (Approx. 220 billion USD)
